

Great Things in Small Places



The Piedmont Avenue Branch Library -- that's the modular building next to the school on Echo Avenue -- probably has more going on per square foot than any other branch in Oakland's system, especially now that it's open on Mondays.

Six days a week it hosts programs for a wide range of ages and interests. Every Wednesday there are two activity groups, one following the other, for those too young for school. Fridays are build days, using big blocks, Legos and other building

materials. Saturdays, there's Baby Cafe, sometimes

at the library, sometimes at Piedmont Gardens, often with performances by live musicians.

In between, you'll find the library furniture rearranged to accommodate the knit and crochet class with students from elementary school age to seniorhood. The recent class just finished, so check with the librarians to see when the next one will be and if there is a waiting list.

Another service is about a less traditional activity than knitting and crocheting: it is about E-books and Downloadable Audiobooks. With your library card and the "app", you can download titles to a computer or a mobile device. To get help with this, you can get one-on-one assistance—thirty minutes with the tech savvy librarian—on Saturdays between 2:30 and 4:00 pm, but you must make an appointment. Appointments can be made online

at www.oaklandlibrary.org/online-resources-e-books-and-digital-content or by calling the Piedmont Avenue branch at 510-507-5011.

Other recent programs have included a magic workshop where you learned how to do magic tricks, a chocolate tasting experience with actual samples, book making, terrarium making and a clown class. Then there was the outdoor petting zoo on National Night Out, with actual farm animals available.

Whether you're a theater buff or a novice, you might want to check out the preview presentation Berkeley Rep brings just prior to each new production.

You get the idea - this is a busy place in a small space, and we didn't even mention the books. More on that later.

Volunteer with Friends of the Oakland Public Library at the Bookmark Bookstore, 721 Washington St.

Interested in volunteering? You can work in the bookstore that raises money for the Oakland Public Library. **Friends**

of the Oakland Public Library (FOPL) operates a used bookstore in Old Oakland at 721 Washington Street between 7th and 8th Streets. There, you'll see a wide variety of used books, interestingly displayed and available for sale at good prices. You can donate books there, giving your books a second and third life.

Please note that training and a 6-month commitment are required for bookstore volunteers. In the training, you'll learn about a variety of tasks such as cash register operation, pricing books, shelving, straightening shelves, assisting customers, and accepting incoming donations. Each volunteer shift is 3 hours per week.

Stop in any day the Bookmark Bookstore is open and talk to the current volunteers. The store is open Monday through Friday from 10:30 am to 5:30 pm. Saturdays it is 10:30 am to 3:30 pm; Sundays it is 10:30 am to 2:00 pm.

The Girl Next Door
by Ruth Rendell



Challenging Assumptions About Old Age

Tired of novels about first love and coming of age among beautiful young people? Had enough of "deep and abiding love after midlife crises" narratives? May be this novel is for you. In The Girl Next Door, Ruth Rendell gives us a story about a group of childhood friends reunited in their seventies who are just as interesting, passionate, and reflective as their patronizing children and grandchildren.

When London builders discover a long-buried cookie tin containing two human hands, the police reunite and question a group of people who played at the site as children in the early 1940s. These men and women reflect upon their memories of uncles who my steriously disappeared, mothers who abruptly ran away, fathers who were cruel, and neighbors who were said to have died in the war time bombing. They also take a look at each other and the choices they've all made and, in some cases, they make changes in their lives. This is a novel about reflection. There are no car chases or daring escapes but there is plenty of insight into the nature of marriage, the need to relinquish disappointment, and the censorious attitudes of the young toward the old.

Perhaps we have so few novels about this age group because few authors write into old age but Ruth Rendell wrote the last of her 60 books when she was in her 80s. Earlier she also wrote a wonderful series about a detective named Reg Wexford and a series of stand-alone psychological thrillers. In this book her plotting is well-paced, her characters are fascinating, and her humor is sharp.
