OPL's Kids' Summer Reading Program rewards children for reading or listening to books or other materials that they pick out themselves.

History of The Piedmont Avenue Branch Library – Part 2

Part one, in the May 2019 issue of HOOT, ended with closing of the library's first home, the building on 41st Street, where the branch had remained for 80 years – 1932 to 2012. Part two begins with that move.

When the building at 160 4th Street was sold in 2012 to a private company, the City of Oakland leased a modular building on the grounds of Piedmont Avenue Elementary School for the new home of the branch.

In late October 2012, the move, organized and directed by librarian Jenera Burton, was a neighborhood affair. First, the thousands of books, the furniture, the computers and the like were transported in secure vehicles. Then, thanks to someone's brilliant idea, the annual Hallowe'en parade down Piedmont Avenue became a moving caravan with library patrons and their children carrying the odds and ends by hand to the modular building on Echo Avenue.

When everything had been deposited in that empty building, the doors were locked and the librarians, other workers and volunteers from Friends of Piedmont Avenue Library went to work. There were bookcases to be placed and stabilized, chairs, tables and the reception desk to be placed, signs to be attached, computers to be installed. The big job of mostly physical labor took more than two weeks and on November 27, 2012, the library opened its doors again.

Now this branch, one of the smallest in the Oakland system, with a regular staff of four and a half, has become like the train in the children's book, *The Little Engine That Could*. With a circulation of 5000 to 6000 checkouts a month, it is among the ten busiest in the Oakland system.

The next chapter in its history is in the making now as Friends of Piedmont Avenue Library campaigns for a permanent home in this neighborhood.

The Book Worm Recommends

***Belgravia* by Julian Fellowes**



A light hearted romp through the British class system

This book by the author of *Downton Abbey*, Julian Fellowes, describes the same world—magnificent wealth, worry about a male heir needed to secure all this privilege, headstrong young women who refuse to marry for money, and wounding social snubs coming from all directions. Set in the 1850s, the story involves the beautiful daughter of a (*gasp!*) tradesman who falls in love with the son of a Duke, a secret heir who is hidden from view, lost legal papers that emerge in the nick of time, an evil presumptive heir who seduces and is blackmailed by a cheating wife, and so on. All are interesting characters, and all are well described.

The story is like a game of solitaire, the rules are rigid and immutable, but cards are turned up in succession that rearrange the whole game. The fun is in not knowing what will appear next and in seeing new possibilities emerge where formerly none existed. It is enjoyable to see the author's nimble and unexpected plot turns. Not for a minute does the reader worry that anything *really* bad will happen. Fellowes' portrayal of the British class system as a jolly, lighthearted game is in contrast to that of Charles Dickens and Jane Austen who describe the real misery that unequal wealth causes. Fellowes, who is by birth a Conservative peer of the House of Lords, has made a long successful career of describing the class system as a comedy of manners to which he brings a clear and insightful insider's understanding.
