Piedmont CDC Building – Another Step Forward For Our Library

The Friends of PAL welcomed the news that the 7-11 Committee (an advisory group to the Oakland Unified School District) voted on December 12 to recommend against the District declaring the now-vacant Piedmont Child Development Center (CDC) building to be "surplus property".



That is what we hoped for.

At the conclusion of the December 12th meeting, we learned that the 7-11 Committee's recommendations would say that a branch library was listed first on the their list of "priority uses" for the CDC building.

Members of the Friends of PAL Steering Committee will now be watching for the 7-11 Committee's report to make sure it reflects all of the concerns in our November 20 letter to the Committee, as well as the large number of emails and comments the 7-11 Committee received from other community members in support of the library.

The full text of the Committee's recommendations will not be available until January 13, 2020. Then, the OUSD Board could receive the Committee's report as early as January 22, so library friends should be ready to express their support for the 7-11 Committee's report and advocate for a joint-occupancy agreement between OUSD and the City of Oakland that would move the Piedmont Avenue branch library into the CDC building on a long-term lease.

Let's say it's the first day of a week you're spending at a spa in Palm Springs. You've just had a manicure when you discover that you failed to pack the book you're halfway through. A murder my stery, you haven't figured out who the killer is. Oh no! What to do?

You have two hours before today's massage, so you grab a ride into town and head for the library. You get the book, catch a ride back and return, with fifteen minutes to spare.

But what about a library card, you ask. You don't have a card for that library. Great news: your Oakland library card will let you borrow books all over the state, with only a couple of exceptions.

Although the official name of our local library, part of the Oakland library system, is Piedmont Avenue library, it is not on Piedmont Avenue and serves the cities of Piedmont and Emeryville as well as Oakland. Those towns, with no libraries of their own, have an agreement with Oakland that allows their residents to have an Oakland library card. But, again, that card can be used all over the state and not only for borrowing books but for other activities as well. For attending a class or event, say. In November Piedmont Avenue library conducted or sponsored 49 of them — more than one every day. Piedmont Gardens hosted some.

Back to Palm Springs. You didn't finish the book while you were there and want to read on the plane. No problem, you can mail the book back to Palm Springs.

Agent Running in the Field by John Le Carré



When power politics replace ideology in shaping government actions

Le Carré's novels pit good against evil and that struggle never gets old. "Good" characters are honest, idealistic people, sincere in their friendships and as lovers, and generous to others. "Evil" characters conspire for power and money, believe the end justifies the means, and cynically discard the weak. In the author's twenty-two novels, evil is always wining, and his focus is on a hero who is doing his best but being marginalized. Cynicism prevails but does not always win.

This novel focuses on Nat, a British expert on running intelligence agents in the field. He recruits, supports, and assists foreign agents who are spying for Great Britain in Europe. Nat is being marginalized because foreign diplomacy now focuses on Brexit, Trump, Putin and a whole lot of technology. Nat meets a young, guileless man who fears that Brexit will subjugate the UK to American financial power, and therefore Trump's deference to Putin. The timeliness of the issues adds greatly to the novel's interest and allows Le Carré such zingers as "a visit to London where Trump will humiliate his host".

As always, the writing is wonderful. The plot includes astonishing events, complex spy tradecraft details, uncanny analytical insights that change the story, and clever subterfuges to escape the bad guys. Even better, we get rich descriptions of Nat's realistic but loving reflections on the people around him and their sometimes amusing, sometimes heartbreaking actions and choices. Le Carré novels are hard on the good guy, but he usually wins.
